WHAT IS ORDINARY TIME?

(continued from previous bulletin) 6 IDEAS FOR ORDINARY TIME

Attending daily Mass, saying the Rosary, and going o confession more frequently are all very good practices to incorporate during Ordinary Time. But for something a little bit different, try one or more of these six ideas, which are both a little different and deeply rooted in our traditions.

Create your own novenas. A novena, nine days of private or public prayer intended to obtain a special grace, favor, or blessing has long been a part of the Church's devotions. You can find novenas for everything from world peace to healing, most of which are directed to end on a particular feast day of Mary, Jesus, or prominent saint. But you can create your own novena, choosing your own ending day and devotional activity. For instance, create a birthday novena. Do something special for the nine days before your birthday or the birthday of someone you love. You can certainly say a prayer like the Hail Mary or the Our Father, but you might also light a candle, read a poem, work on a piece of art, or plant a flower. Whatever you do, place yourself in the presence of God and offer your whole activity with your whole heart, mind, and soul.

Keep a gratitude journal. Some scientific studies have shown that people who regularly "count their blessings" are happier than those who don't. Often we are so focused on the negatives in our lives we overlook the positives. So, during Ordinary Time take a small notebook and, once a day, write at lease five things you are thankful for. They don't have to be earth-shattering—a cup of coffee will suffice. Then, on Sunday, read aloud your list, saying before each item: "God, thank you for..." It seems like a simple activity, but it can literally be life changing as a concrete, permanent record of the blessing of your life that is hard to overlook even when you are feeling down. Ten Principles Of Civil Communication: Defending the Faith without Raising Your Voice—and **Losing Friends** (continued from previous bulletin)

We can defend our Catholic faith without raising our voices.

- Be Compassionate They will know we are Christians by our love, even in heated debate. Learning to be compassionate when involved in exchanges on our most contentious issues will help break our culture out of the cycle of mutual rebuke. It may be sometimes that we simply need to be good listeners, ready to absorb the anger and hurt that some people have with the Church. Listening and compassion can be a priceless witness.
- Check your facts, but avoid robotics Good preparation involves having helpful Catholic facts and figures that reframe a discussion. But a fact is meaningless without content and perspective. Don't get sucked into statistical ping-pong or talking point whack-a-mole. Remember, you don't have to-and can't-say everything. Stay on point and leave other issues for later. Always remember the bigger picture. (continued in next bulletin)
